TIPS & TRICKS

Insights from the field.

This section is dedicated to sharing practical tips and techniques from experienced wildlife volunteers to help everyone—new and seasoned alike. Sometimes, the simplest advice can make the biggest difference in the field!

 \square Have a tip, trick, or technique you'd like to share with the wildlife community? We'd love to hear from you—your insights could be invaluable to others.

SHARE YOUR TIPS & TRICKS →

This edition's tip:

When rescuing a joey directly from its mother's pouch, try rubbing the inside of the fabric pouch with the mum's scent. This simple step can help reduce the joey's stress levels, offering it comfort during the transition.

Let's share and grow together!

Summer tips to beat the heat:

- Placing a wet towel over smaller outdoor enclosures can provide a cool and shady hiding for critters in need.
- Shallow water container can be placed around your garden for wildlife to drink from - but make sure there is a stick or rock in the water to allow animals to drink without drowning.
- Refresh water sources frequently: In extreme heat, water evaporates quickly, so check and refill containers regularly.
- Mist spray bottles can be used to lightly mist enclosures and foliage, mimicking a natural cooling effect.
- Create shady spots with cut foliage the ends of branches can be bound together with rope and leaned against the edges of the enclosure to ensure your critters can seek shade.

Celebrating our wildlife heroes

We couldn't do it without you!

This section celebrates the incredible individuals who go above and beyond for wildlife. Whether you're a carer, rescuer, or someone lending a helping hand, every act of kindness makes a difference.

A Rare Act of Kindness: Nature at Its Best

This edition, we want to share a truly remarkable story from Lyndsey and Jess, two dedicated carers in Northern Tasmania, who turned tragedy into hope for a family of masked lapwings.

While driving one evening, Lyndsey witnessed a devastating accident where a family of masked lapwings was struck by a car. The father bird and one of the chicks were tragically killed, while the mother bird was critically injured, and the two surviving chicks were left vulnerable. Lyndsey quickly brought the injured mother and her chicks to Jess, whose property is equipped with an ICU setup for wildlife care.

Despite their best efforts, the mother bird succumbed to her injuries overnight, leaving the two chicks orphaned. Knowing how challenging it is to raise masked lapwings in captivity, Jess had an idea—a bold one. She noticed that the lapwings in her yard had chicks of their own, about the same age as the orphans. With Lyndsey's support, they decided to try an unusual approach: introducing the orphaned chicks to the backyard lapwing family, hoping they would accept them.

In the early morning mist, Jess carefully placed the two orphaned chicks near the lapwing family, then retreated to her verandah to observe. The mother lapwing, initially startled, quickly flew over to the peeping chicks. Without hesitation, she nestled them under her, as though they had been hers all along. The lapwing's existing chicks emerged from hiding and joined the new arrivals as if nothing unusual had happened.

After a full day of observation, it was clear the plan had worked: the orphaned chicks had been successfully adopted. With their new parents' care and the protection of a very supportive father lapwing, the two orphaned chicks now have a chance to thrive in the wild.

Jess shared, "This experience has completely changed my perspective on what's possible. Knowing that wild lapwings can accept and raise orphaned chicks gives me hope that more birds might benefit from this 'cuckoo' method in the future."

This rare act of kindness—both human and avian—is a testament to the resilience of wildlife and the dedication of carers like Lyndsey and Jess. Thank you both for sharing this heartwarming story and for all you do for Tasmania's wildlife.
